District Mission Statement

The Hacienda La Puente Unified School District is a community committed to developing lifelong learners who value themselves and the diversity of all people; apply decision-making skills leading to responsible actions; and use creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving in meeting the challenges of a changing society.

Principal's Message

This is the twenty-fourth School Accountability Report Card (SARC), as established by the people of California with the passage of Proposition 98, which provides us with the opportunity to make public, the status of our educational program. Each school is charged with the responsibility for developing and distributing this SARC to all segments of the community.

The Baldwin staff has successfully addressed their goals for 2011-2012. We are proud of the great success we have made on our API growth score; our current API score is 858. Baldwin Academy is the first school on the north side of the District to exceed 800 points on their API score. The School Site Council and Leadership Team have met and discussed our school and its educational program.

Areas of emphasis during the 2012-13 school year have been identified. The goal will continue to be for students to make progress in math, reading and developing critical thinking and problem solving skills in Science and Technology. Staff meetings are designed for teachers to explore methods and materials to teach critical thinking and problem solving in all curricular areas. Staff development activities will assist teachers in math, reading, writing, and technology.

Our Action Plan is being implemented and time and resources are being provided to review and modify the existing school plan, with extensive emphasis on student writing. We continue to look for ways to help all students be successful in reading, writing, and math. We shall report to you as we progress so that you will be aware of our efforts. As a staff we want the best education for our students and we are committed to that goal.

Community & School Profile

The Hacienda La Puente Unified School District is the largest school district in the San Gabriel Valley, serving more than 78,800 students; 25,000 pre-K-12 and 30,000 adult education students at two main facilities and 32 satellite sites. The District also has the largest correctional education program in the nation, serving an additional 33,000 students at eight correctional facilities throughout Los Angeles County. The 11.5 square mile District serves the diverse communities of City of Industry, Hacienda Heights, La Puente and portions of Valinda and West Covina. The District includes 20 elementary schools, four K-8 schools, six middle schools, four comprehensive high schools, one alternative high school, an orthopedic unit for the physically handicapped, and an extensive child development and adult education program.

The District also maintains an Administration Center, an Instructional Services Center, a Multilingual Assessment Center, a Professional Library, and a Curriculum Lab.

Baldwin Academy lies in the northern section of the city of La Puente, near the community of Valinda. The school operates on a traditional school calendar. During the 2011-12 school year, the school served 744 students in grades kindergarten through six. The chart displays school enrollment broken down by ethnicity.

Baldwin Academy is committed to providing a strong instructional program for all students to ensure excellence in education. The school is proud to have been named a Title I Achieving School three years in a row and a 2007 California Distinguished School. Baldwin Academy was one of only 35 schools in the State nominated for the national Blue Ribbon award. The California Business and Education Association also recognized the school for outstanding scholastic achievement. Hundreds of educational professionals from all across the State visit the school every year to study the school's curriculum and programs to learn from the school's success.

Baldwin Academy is proud of its efforts to create a college-bound culture. Every Tuesday is "College Day," when teachers wear shirts from different colleges across the country. Students are also encouraged to wear college shirts and participate in activities throughout the year.

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Hacienda La Puente Unified School District annually provides a Student Conduct Code for each of its sites which is supplemented by a set of behavioral standards developed by Baldwin Academy. The program's design establishes guidelines to provide students with a meaningful, productive, and enjoyable school experience. Appropriate behavior is encouraged through praise and motivational incentives, as well as assertive discipline and conflict resolution tools to further develop personal growth.

Students at Baldwin Academy are guided by specific rules and classroom expectations that promote respect, cooperation, courtesy, and acceptance of others. The school's discipline philosophy, modeled after the Character Counts! program, promotes a safe school, a warm, friendly classroom environment, and demonstrates that good discipline is a solid foundation on which to build an effective school. The goal of Baldwin Academy's discipline program is to provide students with opportunities to learn self-discipline through a system of consistent rewards and consequences for their behavior. Parents and students are informed of discipline policies at the beginning of each school year through the School Handbook and reinforced throughout the year during parent conferences, in-services, and school assemblies. Students who are found to exemplify characteristics of good behavior are rewarded weekly during classroom presentations and school assemblies.

The Suspensions and Expulsions table displays the total number and percentage of incidents at the school and in the District. Suspension numbers may be inflated because some students may have been suspended multiple times. Expulsions occur only when required by law or when all other alternatives have been exhausted.

ASES Program

Hacienda La Puente USD provides the FREE After School Education and Safety (ASES) program at 21 elementary and middle schools. This program is a result of the 2002 voter-approved initiative, Proposition 49, in which partnerships between schools and local community resources provide literacy, academic enrichment and safe constructive alternatives for students in kindergarten through ninth grade immediately upon the conclusion of the regular school day.

School Attendance

Regular attendance, punctuality, and promptness at Baldwin Academy are necessary parts of the learning process and are critical to academic success. School districts receive financial support from the State for the education of the students they serve based on how many students attend each day. Attendance, tardiness, and truancy policies are clearly stated, consistently enforced, and consequences fairly administered. Parents are advised of their responsibilities including notification of when and why students are referred to the office.

Regular daily attendance is a priority at Baldwin Academy. School attendance is monitored closely by the attendance clerk and school principal. The parents of students with excessive absences are required to meet with the school principal to develop a plan to improve daily attendance. If the attendance does not improve the student and parent are referred to the District's School Attendance Review Board (SARB).

Hacienda La Puente Unified School District's School Attendance Review Board (SARB) is composed of parents, representatives from the District, and members of the community, including representatives from law enforcement, welfare, probation, and mental health agencies. Students are referred to SARB when they have persistent attendance and behavior problems in school, and when the normal avenues of classroom, school, and District counseling are not effective. The members of the SARB, the referred students, and their parents or guardians meet regularly to evaluate the student's situation and recommend alternative solutions to alleviate circumstances that contribute to specific truancy, attendance, or behavior problems.

Class Size

Staff Development

Professional development within the District addresses the individual needs of teachers as well as broader school concerns. For the past three years, there have been no districtwide staff development days, but there are various methods by which professional development has been provided. These include afterschool workshops, inservices, summer institutes, and professional conferences with guest speakers and consultants.

Counseling & Support Staff

It is the goal of Baldwin Academy to assist students in their social and personal development as well as in academics. The school provides special attention to students who experience achievement or behavioral difficulty. The school does not have an academic counselor. Hacienda La Puente Unified School District's emphasis is on a well-balanced and rigorous core curriculum at all grade levels. Instructional programs are aligned with State and District standards. It is the District's goal to ensure that all students are provided the support they need in order to experience success in their academic career. Through teacher training, monitoring of student achievement, and modification of instruction, Baldwin Academy is able to offer programs to meet the individual needs of its students.

The Gifted and Talented (GATE) program is offered to students in grades 3-6 who have been recognized by their teachers as capable of higher levels of achievement. GATE students may participate in after-school activities, field trips, and publishing a school newspaper.

For students whose primary language is not English, and who have limited English proficiency, Baldwin Academy offers programs to prepare them to meet the State's academic content and performance standards. Students are identified as English Learners through the California English Language Development Test (CELDT). Those students identified as English Learners are assigned to appropriately credentialed teachers and receive 30 minutes of English Language Development instruction daily. Students are grouped by grade level and language proficiency.

Baldwin Academy offers support to students whose test results indicate they need additional assistance to achieve grade level proficiency. Students may participate in before- and after-school tutoring in either one-on-one or small group instruction. The school works diligently to maintain open communication with parents regarding their child's progress throughout the school year.

Baldwin Academy provides instruction to all students in the least restrictive environment possible. Students with special needs are accommodated with a variety of options. A team consisting of the parent, school administrator, general education teacher, psychologist, and special education teacher, develops an Individual Education Plan (IEP). The IEP defines the individualized instruction and assistance a student will receive which may include sessions with a Resource Specialist and after-school tutoring.

Student Achievement & Testing

Various measures of student achievement are used as an ongoing part of the quality instructional program at Baldwin Academy. These assessments measure students' actual progress as well as the effectiveness of the instructional program.

California Standards Test

The California Standards Test (CST), a component of the STAR Program, is administered to all students in the spring to assess student performance in relation to the State Content Standards. Student scores are reported as performance levels: Advanced (exceeds state standards), Proficient (meets standards), Basic (approaching standards), Below Basic (below standards), and Far Below Basic (well below standards).

The first table displays the percent of students achieving at the Proficient or Advanced level (meeting or exceeding the state standards) in English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Social Science, and Science, for the most recent three-year period. The second table displays the percent of students, by group, achieving at the Proficient or Advanced level (meeting or exceeding the state standards) for the most recent testing period.

California Modified Assessment (CMA)

The California Modified Assessment (CMA) is an alternate assessment (a STAR Program component) that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; Mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and Science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.

California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)

The California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), a component of the STAR Program, includes ELA and Mathematics in grades two through eleven, and Science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

Physical Fitness (School Year 2011-12)

In the spring of each year, Baldwin Academy is required by the State to administer a physical fitness test to all students in fifth grade. The physical fitness test is a standardized evaluation that measures each student's ability to perform fitness tasks in six major areas. This table displays by grade level the percent of students meeting fitness standards (scoring in the "healthy fitness zone" on all six fitness standards) for the most recent testing period. Academic Performance Index

The Academic Performance Index (API) is an annual measure of the academic performance and progress of schools in California. API scores range from 200 to 1,000, with a statewide target of 800.

Statewide and similar schools API ranks are published when the Base API is released each March. The statewide API rank ranges from 1 to 10. A statewide rank of 1 means that the school has an API score in the lowest 10 percent of all schools in the State, while a statewide rank of 10 means that the school has an API score in the highest 10 percent of all schools in the State.

The similar schools API rank reflects how a school compares to 100 statistically matched "similar schools." A similar schools rank of 1 means that the school's academic performance is comparable to the lowest performing 10 schools of the 100 similar schools, while a similar schools rank of 10 means that the school's academic performance is better than at least 90 of the 100 similar schools.

Adequate Yearly Progress (School Year 2011-12)

No Child Left Behind (NCLB) is a Federal law enacted in January 2002 that reauthorized the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). It mandates that all students (including students who are economically disadvantaged, are from racial or ethnic minority groups, have disabilities, or have limited English proficiency) in all grades meet the State academic achievement standards for Mathematics and English/Language Arts by 2014. Schools must demonstrate "Adequate Yearly Progress" (AYP) toward achieving that goal.

The Federal NCLB Act requires that all schools and districts meet the following AYP requirements:

- Participation rate on the State's standards-based assessments in English/Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics.
- · Percent proficient on the State's standards-based assessments in ELA and Mathematics.
- · API as an additional indicator.
- · Graduation rate.

There are several consequences for schools that do not meet the AYP standards, including additional tutoring and replacing of staff. Students would also be allowed to transfer to schools (within their District) that have met their AYP, and the former school would be required to provide transportation to the new site. Results of school and District performance are displayed in the chart.

Instructional Materials (School Year 2012-13)

Hacienda La Puente Unified School District sets a high priority upon ensuring that sufficient and current textbooks and materials are available to support the school's instructional program. Hacienda La Puente Unified School District held a Public Hearing on August 23, 2012, and determined that each school within the District has sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, or science lab equipment, pursuant to the settlement of *Williams vs. the State of California*. All textbooks and instructional materials used within the District are aligned with the California State Content Standards and Frameworks.

All students, including English Learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects and foreign languages for use in the classroom and to take home. Instructional materials for grades K-8 are selected from the State's most recent list of standards-based materials; for grades 9-12, all materials have been approved by the Board of Education.

Hacienda La Puente Unified School District follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials and the eight-year cycle for textbook adoptions in foreign language and visual and performing arts. District textbook review and adoption activities occur the year following the State's adoption. The table displays information collected in December 2012 about the quality, currency, and availability of the standards-aligned textbooks and other instructional materials used at the school. The District does not have a formal textbook adoption for Health or for Visual and Performing Arts.

School Leadership

Principal Lilia Picado joined the school in the fall of 2012. Leadership at Baldwin Academy is a responsibility shared among District administration, the Principal, instructional staff, students, and parents. All members of the school community are committed to a shared schoolwide vision, which creates a strong foundation toward academic success for all students.

Staff members and parents participate on various committees to ensure instructional programs are consistent with students' needs and comply with District goals. These committees include the School Site Council, Leadership Team, Booster Clubs, English Language Advisory Committee, and School Advisory Council.

Parent & Community Involvement

Parents are involved in many parent educational opportunities offered at Baldwin Academy. The school offers family nights in the areas of literacy, math, and standards, as well as English and GED classes every school day.

Parents and the community are very supportive of the educational program at Baldwin Academy. Numerous programs and activities are enriched by the generous contributions made by the following organizations: Wal-Mart, Del Haven Community Center, Booster Clubs, McDonalds, Southern California Edison, Frito-Lay, In-N-Out Burger, Pizza Hut, and Shakey's.

School Facilities

Baldwin Academy provides a safe, clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. The school is situated on 10 acres. School facilities were built in 1956, with additions built in 1958. They span nearly 40,000 square feet, and include the multi-purpose room, kitchen, staff lounge, office and 38 classrooms. The facility strongly supports teaching and learning through its ample classroom and playground space.

Through a generous donation from Los Angeles County Supervisor Gloria Molina's Office, the school recently completed construction of a new state-of-the-art school library. Students now have access to high quality literature and extensive technological resources to support learning. The chart displays the results of the most recent facilities inspection.

Maintenance and Repair

Safety concerns are the number one priority of Maintenance and Operations. District maintenance supervisors are proactive and conduct inspections at school sites on a continual basis. Repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Cleaning Process and Schedule

The District has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the District. A summary of these standards is available at the school office or at the District office. Currently all schools are on a daily cleaning schedule. The site administration team works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

Safe School Plan

The safety of students and staff is a primary concern of Baldwin Academy. The school is in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and State earthquake standards. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire drills are conducted on a monthly basis and earthquake drills are held quarterly. During lunch, recesses, and before and after school, teachers, noon aides, and administrators supervise students and school grounds, including the cafeteria and playgrounds, to ensure a safe and orderly environment. All visitors must make arrangements with school staff in advance, sign in at the school's office, wear visitors badges during their time on campus, and check out at the office upon leaving.

In 1998, the Comprehensive Safety Plan was developed by the District in consultation with local law enforcement in order to comply with Senate Bill 187 of 1997. The plan provides students and staff a means to ensure a safe and orderly learning environment. Components of the Comprehensive Safety Plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe ingress and egress from school, sexual harassment policies, and dress code guidelines.
