District & School Profile

Twin Rivers Unified School District is California's newest unified school district, combining the former North Sacramento, Del Paso Heights, Rio Linda Union, and Grant Joint Union High School Districts. Started in the 2008-09 school year, Twin Rivers Unified School District is located in Sacramento County and has 34 elementary schools, six junior high schools, five high schools, six charter schools, and seven alternative education schools.

Noralto Elementary School had a beginning enrollment of 667 students in grades kindergarten through six for the 2008-09 school year. Student demographics are illustrated in the chart.

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Noralto Elementary School believes that meaningful learning must occur in a safe, disciplined, and positive environment. Students at Noralto Elementary School are guided by specific rules and classroom expectations that promote respect, cooperation, courtesy, and acceptance of others. The goal of Noralto Elementary School's discipline program is to provide students with opportunities to learn self-discipline through a system of consistent rewards and consequences for their behavior. Parents and students are informed of discipline policies at the beginning of each school year through a beginning of the year assembly, classroom orientation and school newsletters. The wearing of student uniforms contributes to the school's learning environment and helps remove distractions that may deter students from focusing on class work.

The Suspensions and Expulsions table illustrates the unduplicated number of students suspended as well as the percentage of enrollment (students suspended divided by enrollment). Expulsions occur only when required by law or when all other alternatives are exhausted. *Since the district opened in the 2008-09 school year there is no district data reported for two of the last three years. Being a new district it would not be appropriate to assign the performance of any of the old districts to the new district.*

Homework

At Noralto Elementary School homework is a fundamental part of the learning process which helps to develop basic academic and study skills as well as promotes student responsibility and self-discipline. Homework is assigned on a regular basis for all grade levels and major subject areas, and each teacher determines the appropriate measure of homework for his or her students. Students are expected to complete their homework assignments in a timely manner and to the best of their ability. Parents are encouraged to provide a supportive environment for homework activities and to be responsible for reviewing homework assignments with their child.

School Attendance & Enrollment

School districts receive financial support from the state for the education of the students they serve based on how many students attend each day. Most importantly, attendance is critical to academic achievement and regular daily attendance is a priority at Noralto Elementary School. Student attendance is carefully monitored to identify those students exhibiting excessive absences.

Regular attendance at Noralto Elementary School is a necessary part of the learning process and is critical to academic success. Attendance, tardy, and truancy policies are clearly stated, consistently enforced, and consequences fairly administered. Parents are advised of their responsibilities, including proper notification of when and why students are absent. The school monitors student attendance very closely, makes phone calls to parents on a daily basis, and will send letters home if absences become a problem. Noralto Elementary School encourages regular attendance by giving out periodic awards for perfect attendance. Senate Bill 65 established a new school-level position, known as the Outreach Consultant, to reduce school dropout rates by promoting school success of at-risk students. This individual coordinates school and community resources to meet the needs of high-risk students at the school.

Students are referred to the School Attendance Review Board (SARB) when they have persistent attendance and behavior problems in school, and when the normal avenues of classroom, school and district counseling are not effective. The SARB is comprised of parents, representatives from the school district and members of the community, including representatives from law enforcement, welfare, probation and mental health.

The members of the SARB, the referred students and their parents or guardians meet regularly to work collaboratively to evaluate the student's situation and recommend alternative solutions to alleviate circumstances that contribute to specific truancy, attendance or behavior problems. This chart illustrates the enrollment trend by grade level for the past three school years.

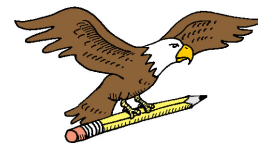

In 1996, state legislature approved implementation of the Class Size Reduction (CSR) program that provides funding to hire additional teachers to assist schools in reducing K-3 class sizes. Noralto Elementary School began implementing CSR for grades kindergarten through three in 1996-1997. Curriculum Development

The writing and implementation of the Twin Rivers Unified School District's curriculum is an ongoing process. The district's curriculum guides are updated regularly to align with the state standards, district goals and the statewide assessment program.

All curriculum development at Noralto Elementary School revolves around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. Teachers work collaboratively to align classroom curriculum to ensure that all students either meet or exceed state proficiency levels. Curriculum planning is accomplished through a careful analysis of the state frameworks, district policies, the needs of students, assessment results and research. The construction and implementation of the curriculum is an on-going process.

Noralto Elementary School utilizes various specialized programs to support its curriculum. An English Language Resource Teacher assists classroom teachers with developing appropriate curriculum.

English Language Development instruction is administered by classroom teachers certified with CLAD (Crosscultural, Language and Academic Development) credentials.

Instructional Materials

Twin Rivers Unified School District held a public hearing in October 2009, and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, and science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of *Williams vs. the State of California*. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. Textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted according to a cycle developed by the California Department of Education, making the textbooks used in the school the most current available. Materials approved for use by the State are reviewed by teachers and a recommendation is made to the School Board by a selection committee composed of teachers and administrators. All teachers have the opportunity to review the materials. All recommended materials are available for parent examination at the district office prior to adoption. The table displays information about the quality, currency, and availability of the standards-aligned textbooks and other instructional materials used at the school.

Noralto Elementary School utilizes supplemental instruction, and offers a Special Day Class for students with special needs. The Special Day class ensures that students are getting the necessary specialized instruction.

Students needing assistance in learning English receive special instruction from an English Language Resource teacher and Bilingual Para-professionals. A student is classified as a fluent English speaker when he/she is able to progress in the instructional program without further language assistance.

A Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) program is available for those students who qualify, where students receive challenging supplemental instruction.

California Standards Test

The California Standards Test (CST), a component of the STAR Program, is administered to all students in the spring to assess student performance in relation to the State Content Standards. Student scores are reported as performance levels: Advanced (exceeds state standards), Proficient (meets standards), Basic (approaching standards), Below Basic (below standards), and Far Below Basic (well below standards). The combined percentage of students scoring at the Proficient and Advanced levels in English/Language Arts, Math, and Science, for the most recent three-year period, is shown. *Since the district opened in the 2008-09 school year there is no district data reported for two of the last three years. Federal Intervention Program

Adequate Yearly Progress

No Child Left Behind (NCLB) is a federal law enacted in January 2002 that reauthorized the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). It mandates that all students (including students who are economically disadvantaged, are from racial or ethnic minority groups, have disabilities, or have limited English proficiency) in all grades meet the state academic achievement standards for Mathematics and English/Language Arts by 2014. Schools must demonstrate "Adequate Yearly Progress" (AYP) toward achieving that goal. The Federal NCLB Act requires that all schools and districts meet the following Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) requirements:

- Participation rate on the state's standards-based assessments in English/Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics.
- Percent proficient on the state's standards-based assessments in ELA and mathematics.
- API as an additional indicator.
- Graduation rate (for secondary schools).

There are several consequences for schools that do not meet the AYP standards, including additional tutoring and replacing of staff. Students would also be allowed to transfer to schools (within their district) that have met their AYP, and the former school would be required to provide the transportation to the new site. Results of school and district performance are displayed in the chart. *Since the district opened in the 2008-09 school year there is no district data reported for two of the last three years. Being a new district it would not be appropriate to assign the performance of any of the old districts to the new district.*

National Assessment of Educational Progress

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is a nationally representative assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Assessments are conducted periodically in mathematics, reading, science, writing, the arts, civics, economics, geography, and U.S. history. Student scores for reading and mathematics are reported as performance levels (i.e., basic, proficient, and advanced) and the participation of students with disabilities (SD) and English language learners (ELL) is reported based on three levels (identified, excluded, and assessed). Academic Performance Index

The Academic Performance Index (API) is a score on a scale of 200 to 1,000 that annually measures the academic performance and progress of individual schools in California. The state has set 800 as the API score that schools should strive to meet.

Statewide Rank: Schools receiving an API Base score are ranked in ten categories of equal size (deciles) from 1 (lowest) to 10 (highest), according to type of school (elementary, middle, or high school).

Similar Schools Rank: Schools also receive a ranking that compares that school to 100 other schools with similar demographic characteristics. Each set of 100 schools is ranked by API score from 1 (lowest) to 10 (highest) to indicate how well the school performed compared to similar schools.

Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Noralto Elementary School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in fifth grade. The physical fitness test is a standardized evaluation that measures each student's ability to perform fitness tasks in six major areas. Students that meet or exceed the standards in all six fitness areas are considered to be physically fit or in the healthy fitness zone (HFZ). During the 2008-09 school year, 30.3% students were in the HFZ.

Teacher Assignment

Twin Rivers Unified School District recruits and employs the most qualified credentialed teachers. For the 2008-09 school year, Noralto Elementary School had 31 fully credentialed teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with State of California guidelines.

Highly Qualified Teachers

The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "Highly Qualified" no later than the end of the 2006-07 school year. Minimum qualifications include: possession of a Bachelor's Degree, possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects.

Teacher Evaluation & Professional Development

A constructive evaluation process promotes quality instruction and is a fundamental element in a sound educational program. Evaluations and formal observations are designed to encourage common goals and to comply with the state's evaluation criteria and district policies. Temporary and probationary teachers are evaluated annually and tenured teachers are evaluated every other year.

Evaluations are conducted by an administrator, who has been trained and certified for competency to perform teacher evaluations. Evaluation criteria are: Demonstrates Effective Instructional Techniques and Strategies, Establishes and Maintains Suitable Learning Environment, Adherence to District Curricular Objectives, Demonstrates Effective Instructional Techniques and Strategies, Promotes Students' Progress Toward District Standards of Expected Student Achievement, Fulfills Instructional Duties and Professional Responsibilities.

Teachers and other certificated staff members build teaching skills and develop educational concepts through participation in conferences and workshops throughout the year. In the 2008-2009 school year, the Twin Rivers District offered 3 non-student professional development days for elementary teachers and 5 non-student days for secondary teachers. The professional development sessions focused on a broad range of topics including California state core subjects, research-based differentiated teaching strategies, technology and increasing student achievement.

School Leadership

Leadership at Noralto Elementary is a responsibility shared between district administration, the principal, instructional staff, students, and parents. The district's emphasis is on a well-balanced and rigorous core curriculum at all grade levels. Instructional programs are aligned with state and district standards. Leadership duties were assumed by Principal Bradley Allen in 2008. Staff members and parents participate on various committees that make decisions regarding the priorities and direction of the school plan to ensure instructional programs are consistent with students' needs and the school plan complies with district goals.

School Facilities & Safety

The current facilities were built in 1951, and consist of 19 permanent classrooms, 20 portable classrooms, one multipurpose room, one library, two administrative buildings, one computer lab, one staff room, and one playground.

Teachers supervise students on campus before and after school and during recess. The Learning Coordinator and noon-duty supervisors monitor students during lunchtime. All visitors must sign in at the principal's office and receive proper authorization to be at the school. Visitors are asked by the school site staff to display their pass at all times.

Noralto Elementary School's Safety Plan was revised in April 2009 by the Site Safety Committee and reviewed August 2009 by staff. Emergency drills are held on a regular basis; fire drills are held once a month; earthquake and lockdown drills are held twice a year.

The table shows the results of the most recent school facilities inspection. While reviewing this report, please note that even minor discrepancies are reported in the inspection process. The items noted in the table have been corrected or are in the process of remediation.

Cleaning Process and Schedule

The district governing board has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the district. All schools are on a regular cleaning schedule. Each classroom is swept or vacuumed and the trash emptied. The cafeteria, gym, and all restrooms are cleaned daily. Grounds are groomed on a rotating basis, with trash, lawn, and plumbing issues addressed daily.

Maintenance and Repair

District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. Three full-time custodians ensure that all classrooms and facilities are in adequate condition. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. At the time of publication, 100% of restrooms are in complete working order.

Deferred Maintenance Budget

The district participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, paving and floor systems. For the 2009-10 school year, the district has budgeted \$950,000.00 for the deferred maintenance program. This represents 0.39% of the district's general fund budget.
